ORDINARY TIME ISN'T ORDINARY AT ALL

As you know, each liturgical season has its own color- Advent and Lent being violet, white during Christmas and Easter, and red on Passion Sunday, Good Friday and Pentecost Sunday. Outside of these seasons, we have what is known as



Ordinary Time, the longest season of our Church year. Its liturgical color is green. The priest's vestments, the chalice veil and the banners are signals to us that we are in Ordinary Time. But Ordinary Time does not mean that this season is ho-hum, or that it is not extraordinary. Rather, Ordinary Time comes from the word "ordinal" which means "counted" time. You'll notice in the bulletin, on the parish calendars, and in the hymnal section for the readings which Sunday it is in Ordinary Time. August 20 is the Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time, September 3 is the Twenty-first Sunday and so on until November when we reach the last Sunday of the Church Year, the 34th Sunday in Ordinary Time, which is the Solemnity of Christ the King.

Ordinary Time is far from ordinary. In fact I would say that it is very extraordinary. Everything, including time, is graced by God and is pure gift. The very fact that we exist is a gift from God. The reality that God loves us so much that He is present to us at each moment, and that He comes to us in Word, Sacrament and in the events of daily life is, I believe, quite extraordinary! Unlike some religions that believe God is distant and unconcerned about human affairs, Catholic belief is just the opposite. God is everywhere present and always mindful of us and our needs. Each and every Sunday we gather as one to praise God for all that He has done, is doing and will do for us individually and for the life of the world through Jesus and the Holy Spirit. Our worship during Ordinary time is meant to change us more into the people God created us to be. This saying is a good reminder, "Today is a gift, that is why it is called the present." Enjoy the gift of Ordinary Time - unwrap and treasure God's most precious gift to us - Jesus, and share the gifts the Lord has given you.

"He (Jesus) revealed that He desired a deeper relationship with me and that He wanted me to know Him better. Even after that experience of Jesus in the field house (during Adoration at a Steubenville Youth Conference years earlier), I was still living at a distance from Him, and He was now asking for more. I don't remember the rest of the many hours I prayed that summer, but I will always remember that one. When I'm tempted to go back to my old way of living—thinking of Jesus as someone who loves me but is far away—I take myself back to the grace experienced that day and remind myself that His very presence is just a few steps away.

It was in front of the Blessed Sacrament where a lot of debating, deal-making, and experiences of love (and frustration) with Jesus took place. It was my time in front of the Blessed Sacrament that kept me moving forward in the seminary and it is my time in front of the Blessed Sacrament that sustains me today as a priest.

The little boy who wanted to stay as far away from Church as possible is now the man who can't imagine his life without it or the Eucharist. It's all God's work—it's all grace."

HAPPY FEAST OF ST. BARTHOLOMEW!

Did you know that we have, in a sense, a secondary patron saint of our parish? This would be Saint Bartholomew, one of the twelve Apostles, whose feast day is on August 24. In fact, St. Bartholomew was the original patron saint of the parish! When the first Catholic church was



built in Lancaster in 1859, one block east from our present church near what is now the Twin Dragon restaurant, it had a stone over the entrance of the church that read, "ST. BARTHOLOMEW, PRAY FOR US." (This stone can still be seen in the hallway directly outside of the parish office door). When Bishop John Henni of Milwaukee (we were part of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee which encompassed most of Wisconsin) came to Lancaster in 1860 to consecrate the new church, he remarked that there were already a number of churches in the diocese under the patronage of St. Bartholomew. Because of this, he made the decision that the patron (and name) of the parish should be changed to St. Clement. May we not forget our roots, our heritage, and our first patron saint. **SAINT BARTHOLOMEW, PRAY FOR US!**
